After six months of Covid-19 restrictions we are still learning and adapting to a new pattern of life. Many of us have felt frustrated by the impact on our daily lives, our holiday plans, our worship life - there are few areas of life that have been unaffected. Planning our church life together has never been so difficult, especially as we have had to react (sometimes overnight) to new announcements or advice from our Government.

Yet even in this time of trial, I see hope. Our Church Meeting is the decision- making body within our denomination, it is the place where power is held. This is an important aspect of our ecclesiology (our way of being the church). The church is not a dictatorship of the Minister or of any Elder; for the Minister and Elders are servants of the Church Meeting. Both Minister and Elders are chosen and appointed by the Church Meeting. They can make recommendations, but it is the Church Meeting that makes decisions, which is why our AGM in October is so important.

At our Church Meeting in October we will formally receive the reports about the past year. We will be able to thank the faithful servants of our church who are retiring from various roles and we will be able to welcome new Elders and new office holders. I'm particularly pleased that we have been able to find a new Church Secretary (Alison Biggs) and a new Treasurer (Colin Biggs) both of whom are well known to you, as they both lead worship on a very regular basis. I'm also expecting that we'll be able to appoint at least one person (maybe more) as Elder, to replace those who have recently stepped down from this role.

It is in these developments that I see hope, even though the church in Bideford has been unable to worship following our normal pattern, we have continued to share in fellowship due to the commitment of so many people. As from October 4th we will be able to safely gather together and we will be able to continue to provide worship opportunities for everyone at home. Whilst we have been away from the building, our contractors have been making the stone work watertight, checking the lightning conductors and removing the shrubs from the spires!

Last month we published a list of all the work that the contractor was planning to do on the church building and it was quite a list. We are delighted to hear that the work is almost completely finished. There may still be some finishing off at ground level to improve the earthing of the lightning conductors. We are just waiting to hear from the architect who was due to make a site visit this week to inspect the works.

Hopefully, we will see the scaffolding removed in October and we should be able to return to the church sanctuary for our worship.

## FAVOURITE HYMNS: HOW GREAT THOU ART

This song began life as a poem by the Swedish poet and politician Carl Boberg (1859-1940), who was walking home from church one Sunday afternoon when he was caught in a heavy storm and had to run for cover under some trees. When he got home, he opened the window and was struck by the singing of a bird and the calmness of the sea.

The contrast between the two scenes stirred his soul, so he sat down to write a poem and called it '*O Mighty God*'. He got it printed in a local paper which he edited and a local musician matched the words to a traditional Swedish folk tune.

At a later date, it was translated into German, then Russian, where it became a favourite with the Ukrainians and where, in the 1930s, an English missionary, Stuart K. Hine, translated it into English, adding verses of his own and giving it its current title. He published it in a missionary magazine, '*Grace and Peace*', which went all over the world, including India, where a travelling evangelist - Edwin Orr - heard it being sung by a Naga choir, in the extreme east of the country. He took it back to the USA, where it was sung on the college circuit by '*Sons of the Pioneers*', a group of singing cowboys, including Roy Rogers.

The song was then picked up by George Shea, who was the soloist on Billy Graham's travelling crusades and it eventually became Billy Graham's signature tune, sung regularly live on radio and TV and reaching millions of people.

It has been recorded nearly 2000 times by various artists; most famously by Elvis Presley, who recorded it twice in 1967 and 1974 and won him a Grammy each time. In Britain, it was not well known until Billy Graham's later crusades, but now it is a firm favourite and has been voted Britain's favourite hymn on several occasions.

## A LETTER FROM YOUR ACTING TREASURER

The church building has been closed since mid-March until now. Because of the Covid crisis you would imagine that a closed church building would cost very little to run. For instance, the electricity, gas and water bills will be much reduced.

We derive a good income from the renting of the manse and from those church members who pay their offerings directly into the bank by standing order.

However, at the same time we have lost all of our main sources of income, in particular the money we get from the Freewill Offering Envelope Scheme – which have now begun to come in - rental of the church halls, money raised at the Tuesdays coffee / lunches, Gift Day, our Summer Fayre and Christmas Fayre. In other words, all our annual fund-raising events. All this at a time when we still need to pay into the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund every month (£1744.00) which pays all ministers stipends, retired ministers pensions, training of new ministers etc. We also have high monthly insurance to pay (£401.40). Additionally, we have been paying reduced fees to our preachers for preparing our written services fortnightly - with the exception of Rob - and the wages of our organist Sally and our cleaner, Russell throughout this period. Plus, other miscellaneous expenses.

Therefore, this is a plea from your Acting Treasurer to ask that those of you who use the Envelope Scheme, but have not yet handed in your envelopes, can do so now either by bringing them to a church service, or giving them to any Elder, or delivering them to me at my home (42 North View Avenue, Bideford).

If you are thinking of paying your offerings into the bank directly by standing order in the future, could you please do so on a monthly, rather than a weekly basis, to minimise the paperwork. Perhaps you could have a word with me first.

We need and look forward to your continuing financial support.

## ETERNAL WALL of ANSWERED PRAYER



In about 2 years' time, drivers on the M6 motorway will see something new. A giant national Christian landmark to be built on the outskirts of Birmingham, has been given all the necessary planning permissions to go ahead.

The vision of Professor Revd Richard Gamble, says, *"I'd put it down to prayer."* Richard, a former Leicester City FC chaplain has been planning this monument since 2004 when he had a vision while carrying a cross through Leicestershire at Easter time.

To be known as *Eternal Wall of Answered Prayer*, the iconic structure will be constructed using one million bricks, each representing individual prayers that have been answered for people across the country. Additionally, using interactive technology and a bespoke app, visitors will be able to use their smart phone by holding it against any brick to read the individual answered prayers and personal stories behind them

After gaining Planning Permission, Richard Gamble said, *"It is an amazing opportunity for the British people to leave a legacy of hope visible to the UK. What we are doing is historic"*.

Of course, it has its opponents. Since 1983 the proportion of people who identify as Christian has fallen from 66% to 38%. Nevertheless, Richard has been able to assemble a network of supporters and donors including Lord Edmiston, a successful car importer, Conservative donor and evangelical Christian, who provided the 10 acres of land.
